


GUIDE TO CLUBS & ORGANIZATIONS

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Guide to Clubs and Organizations



Philosophy of student clubs and organizations: The scope of student clubs and organizations and their activities at The Colony High School is such that their administration requires definite policy, organization, and delegation of responsibility. In planning and establishing a student club or organization in the high school, it must be remembered that the purpose of these groups is to develop participation and dependable, socially minded and mature citizens.

CLUBS AND ORGANIZATIONS

Student clubs, organizations, and performing groups such as band, cheerleaders, choir, drill teams, and athletic teams may establish rules of conduct and consequences for behavior that are stricter than those applied to the general student body. If a student violates one of these, it also is a violation of school rules. The consequences specified by the school shall apply in addition to any consequences specified by the organization.

DEFINITION OF EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

See section <u>19 Texas Administrative Code Chapter 76, Extracurricular Activities</u>, in short, is defined as any activity outside of school curriculum.

DEFINITION OF CO-CURRICULAR

Co-curricular activities are an extension of classroom instruction in which participation is by the entire class or a significant portion thereof. They relate directly to, and enhance student learning of, essential elements through participation, demonstration, illustration, and observation. Co-curricular activities are included in the teacher's instructional plan and are conducted by or supervised by a classroom teacher or other educational professional.

GUIDELINES FOR ACTIVITIES

- 1. A number of student clubs or organizations and a variety of co-curricular activities are included in the school program to provide enrichment and to contribute to the development of students.
- 2. All school clubs or organizations will schedule meeting times with their sponsor in an effort to avoid conflicts.
- 3. The sponsor or an organization officer, with permission of their sponsor, is to secure approval from the administration before arranging for extra or unusual activities.
- 4. After obtaining permission to schedule a meeting or activity, the sponsor should notify the assistant principal in charge of building use or rental and make arrangements for the room(s).
- 5. Clubs or organizations may be charged for the custodian's time at the building. Any other arrangements must be cleared through the principal of the school.
- 6. Clubs or organizations will not be permitted to meet unless the club or organization sponsor is present.
- 7. Clubs and organizations sponsors must submit an application for fundraising and have it approved by Administration prior to planning any fundraising activity.

OVERNIGHT TRIPS

The board shall permit students to take school-sponsored overnight trips for the following purpose:

- 1. Instructional purpose (field trips and excursions). Approval for trips shall be from the Principal.
- 2. Activities of school-sponsored or sanctioned club or organizations. Approval for the trip shall be from the Principal.
- 3. UIL or other sanctioned competitions. Approval for the trip shall be from the Principal.

ACTIVITY FUNDS MANAGEMENT

Each school shall have and maintain a student activity account to manage funds, organization funds, and any other funds into which students have put money in the name of the school. All monies collected shall be receipted by the principal or a designee and deposited to appropriate District account, at the District depository, on the same day if possible.

The principal of the school shall be responsible for the proper administration of each organization's funds in accordance with state and local laws, District-approved accounting practices and procedures, and TEA Bulletin 679.

Monies collected by student groups shall be disbursed only for purposes authorized by the organization or upon approval of the sponsor. The principal or a designee shall approve all disbursements. All funds raised by student organizations must be expended for the benefit of the students.

SECRET SOCIETIES

The board prohibits any fraternity, sorority, or secret society, defined by state law as "any organization composed wholly or in part of public school below the rank of college or junior college...which seeks to perpetuate itself by taking in additional members from the pupils enrolled in such school on the basic of the decision of its membership, rather than upon the free choice of any pupil in the school, who is qualified under the rules of the school, to fill the special aims of the organization."

Any student who becomes or remains a member, of any such fraternity, sorority, or secret society shall be recommended for placement in an alternative education program.

ACADEMIC DECATHLON

This course is Fall Semester, 4th period class, rather than a "club", open to juniors and seniors who enjoy academic competition. The United States Academic Decathlon is a team competition wherein students match their intellects with students from other schools. Students are tested in ten categories:

Art, Economics, Essay, Interview, Language and Literature, Mathematics, Music, Science, Social Studies, and Speech.

Based on the model of the athletic decathlon, the Academic Decathlon requires participants to prepare for ten academic events. Like the athletic contest, the Academic Decathlon does not permit participants to specialize, but rather the Academic Decathlon encourages academic versatility by requiring students to prepare for all ten events. The Academic Decathlon stresses educational opportunity and academic excellence.

BAND

The Colony High School Band is one of the most honored organizations at TCHS. Middle school band participation is a pre-requisite for membership in the high school band.

The Colony Band has performed at the UIL State Marching Contest 8 times (State Finalist on three occasions), has been a TMEA Honor Band State Finalist 6 times, has earned 19 UIL Sweepstakes Awards, performed at the Midwest International Band and Orchestra Convention twice and at the Bands of America National Concert Band Festival, has performed in the Tournament of Roses Parade, and was selected as the 1997 TMEA State Honor Band Champion. The band program has had 61 students earn a chair with the Texas All State Band and Orchestra.

The Colony High School Band program includes Marching Band, Wind Symphony, Symphonic Band, Concert Band, Winter Guard, and an extensive Percussion Program.

BIBLE STUDY CLUB

The purpose of this organization is to create school spirit, loyalty, and pride, while maintaining a high standard of academic excellence. Also, to establish a feeling of loyalty and cooperation through group membership; to set an example of spirit between school and community; to focus on school spirit; while striving for goals to compete successfully at UIL, local and national competitions.

JROTC

The primary objective of the program is to motivate young people to become better citizens. It is not a preparation

program for military service, and cadets are neither encouraged or discouraged from pursuing a desire to serve in the Armed Forces.

The goal of this program to provide a high quality education that leads to life-long learning and success in the responsibilities of citizenship, character building, community service and leadership development. This is accomplished by providing cadets opportunities to develop suitable courses of action to problems and make decisions, lead and develop teams, practice oral communications, public speaking and compete against other JROTC programs in various skills taught within the program.

Strong emphasis is placed on physical fitness and health, character-building that raises self-esteem and self-confidence, engagement in learning, making the right decisions and taking responsibility for all one does, academic achievement and the power of teamwork.

The Cougar battalion's competitive teams have won saeveral Regional and State championships. To be a member of this organization a student must speak with his or her counselor and then be approved by one of the two instructors.

The program also offers other Extra-curricular activities such as:

Honor Guard – This group presents the National Colors at community events such as football, basketball, softball, soccer and other community activities.

Cadet Challenge – Each Company within the Cougar Batallion competes against each other by performing physical fitness events such as: push-ups, curl-ups, pull/chin ups, V-sit reach, shuttle run and the one-mile run.

Drill Team – This activity is separated into two types of drill teams, the un-armed and armed team. Teams march in a military organization style while competing in an inspection, regulation and exhibition phase that qualifies our teams to compete at State, Regional and National level.

Orienteering- This team competes against other clubs from high schools and organizations in meets to locatre marked pointes on a course in the shortest amount of time. Cougar Battalion teams have gone to win State and National honors.

Academics – This team is made of four cadets that answer questions in a jeopardy and written format. The questions are based on JROTC leadership knowledge, government, history, physical training, and current events.

While working hard to achieve success the Cougar Battalion Cadets take pride in themselves, The Colony Community and the causes that they support. They also represent TCHS at parades, take field trips and conduct a Military Ball each year.

LATIN CLUB

Seniors in the group can note their involvement in NEHS on college resumes, and they may also have an honorary cord to wear on their graduation gown as a mark of distinction for their achievement in English. NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

Prospective candidates for membership in the National Honor Society must have a cumulative GPA of 99.0 or higher with one full semester residence at TCHS.

Students with the required scholastic average are asked to complete a Student Activity Form. Students are expected to have participated in community service activities and show outstanding qualities of leadership, character, and service. The details for selection are in the TCHS Student handbook. By national organizations rules, ninth grade students are not eligible for consideration. The National Honor Society is the front-runner of organizations that promote recognition for students who reflect outstanding accomplishments in the area of scholarship, character, leadership, and service. The TCHS National Honor Society Chapter is an active organization. Community service and GPA are criterion for selection and continued membership.

The purpose of The Colony High School National Honor Society is to recognize and encourage academic achievement and to develop characteristics essential to citizens in a democracy, including service, leadership, and character. It also strives to create enthusiasm for scholarship, to stimulate a desire to render service, to promote leadership and to develop character in individuals.

NATIONAL SCIENCE HONOR SOCIETY

The National Science Honor Society is for Juniors and Seniors with a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or above, who are enrolled in an upper level advanced Science class. They

must maintain a 3.5 in ALL of their Science classes to retain membership. Meetings will be once a month and will include discussions on current events, guest speakers and possibly field trips. One of the requirements for National Science Honor Society will be to help with tutoring underclassmen, as well as developing and maintaining a Science Club.

THE COLONY HIGH SCHOOL ORCHESTRA

The Colony High School Orchestra Program offers a wide variety of musical ensembles for string players as well as other musicians. While the primary enrollment in the Orchestra Program is composed of only violin, viola,

cello, bass, piano and harp, other musicians on campus are utilized throughout the year.

Admission to the program is by audition with prior experience needed in either a middle school orchestra or a private instruction situation. Classes offered during the school day are Chamber Strings, Symphony Strings, and Concert Strings. Other ensembles which perform during the year are full Symphony Orchestra, full Philharmonic Orchestra, the Pit Orchestra for the TCHS musicals, and various smaller ensembles as needed for school, community, and civic functions.

The Orchestra Program has grown in both numbers and recognition throughout our state and nation. It has received consistent Sweepstakes Awards at UIL competitions, First Division and Best in Class Awards at the national level, and many of our students have been recognized with Outstanding Soloist awards. Our graduating senior string players are in demand from universities and are consistently awarded very generous scholarships. Each year the orchestra travels to either to a national festival or makes a concert tour which includes master classes with professional musicians. Private study is highly recommended and available on campus during the school day. There is a very active booster organization to lend support to the Orchestra Program.

PEER ASSISTANCE AND LEADERSHIP (PAL)

Members must be a Junior or Senior and must go through an application and interview process. The application process begins in March of the preceding year and interviews are

scheduled in April. Class membership will be announced by the end of April 1st.

P.A.L. is a community emphasized outreach program that involves high school role models. The chosen P.A.L. role models visit with schools within the community, in the hope of being a positive influence on at-risk students at the elementary and middle school campuses that feed into TCHS. PAL services the community in many ways through its efforts in working with youth, D.A.R.E., and other community based groups and events.

Students earn two state credits and must be able to enroll in the class for one full school year. It is offered during third period only.

PHOTOGRAPHY CLUB
