

## **PSAT** Results

- Students must successfully pass ELA I, ELA II, Algebra I, Biology, and US History EOC exams. Some students have COVID exemptions, depending on if they were to take English 1/Algebra 1/Biology during spring of Freshman year
- Students must take all EOCs to graduate.
  - Fall US History Students will take the test in December. Spring US History Students and Dual Credit Humanities Students will test the week of May 2, 2023
  - Students will be contacted for any retake exams.
  - This is all pending and changes from TEA







- Take the most challenging courses possible but be realistic
- TECC-E/TECC-W (Technology, Exploration and Career Centers East and West) course offerings give students the opportunity to get experience in specific fields they may be interested in studying in college
- Dual Credit/Concurrent Enrollment through Collin College


Colleges will see the courses you chose for your senior year!






- Students that have acquired enough credits may take senior off.
- Students may elect to have either 1st or 4th period off all year or for 1 semester.
- Reliable transportation is a requirement. Students do not have the option of waiting in the Library/Cafeteria or anywhere else on campus during their off period
- A signed parent consent form is required





- Accelerated Block allows students the opportunity to graduate at mid-year.
- Students must have at least 22 credits at the end of their junior year and be able to meet all course requirements for their graduation plan.
- Early graduates are not eligible to be valedictorian or salutatorian
- Students must check with the college they wish to attend to determine if early graduation will affect enrollment status, financial aid or scholarships.
- Be on the lookout for early grad letter— the STUDENT must request this from the Counselor
- Things to consider for Early Grad:
  - When to start university: Spring? Summer? Fall?
  - If they want to start in the fall, what do they want to do with the time "off"?
  - Totally okay to work part-time and go to school part time. Need to show the universities/next steps for them that they are pursuing their further academics.
  - Note: Gap years are not looked at too fondly in the US (more common in Europe/Australia, but not here). The minimum: Take College Writing 1 and a Creative Arts class at Collin—you will need them for each degree you want to pursue.





## SAT


- The SAT tests students' knowledge of subjects that are necessary for college success: Critical Reading & Writing and Mathematics. The SAT also assesses the critical thinking skills students need for academic success in college—skills that students learned in high school.
- Each section of the SAT is scored on a scale of 200-800.



#### **ACT**

- The ACT test assesses high school students' general educational development and their ability to complete college-level work.
- The multiple-choice tests cover four skill areas: English, mathematics, reading, and science.
- The Writing Test, which is optional, measures skill in planning and writing a short essay.

\*We recommend taking either the SAT or the ACT by the end of the junior year.



# Tests for Possible College Credit

#### **Advanced Placement Exams**

- Examinations are given in May.
- Student may receive college credit or placement based on exam score.
- Each college sets its own standards for awarding credit or placement. <u>Check a college's AP Credit Policy</u>
- AP Test Dates: May 1st 12th

#### Dual Credit

- Enrolled in High School and College
- Earning High School and College credit at the same time for the same course
- Concurrent
  - Enrolled in High School and College
  - Earn only college credit

## FYI for Students interested in Dual Credit for the First Time, Senior Year

- Be on the lookout for the information session in January/February over webex, all about dual credit
- Apply to Collin for Fall of 2023 at Goapplytexas.org (You will use the Dual Credit application)
- After information session, you will fill out a separate google course request form that will act as a permission form for you to do DC both student and parent needs to sign
- Dr. Robinson and Counselors will put you in dual credit classes
- Payment will be due by end of Spring semester for tuition for Collin for everyone who is not part of the National Free/Reduced Lunch Program







## TSI-Texas Success Initiative

The TSI must be taken prior to enrollment in a Texas public college, university or technical school including students wanting to take dual credit classes.

This test helps colleges determine if you need to take remedial courses prior to your regular coursework.

### **Exemptions:**

- ACT composite of **23** with a minimum of 19 on both the English and Math tests.
- SAT combined verbal and math score of **1070** with a minimum of 500 on both the verbal and math sections.

## **Temporary Waivers:**

• Counselors will review PSAT and STAAR scores to determine if a student is eligible for a temporary waiver for Dual Credit enrollment

- Students are allowed 2 days for college visits during their junior year and 2 days their senior year. Unused days do not carry over. Notify the attendance office if you are going on a college visit.
- College visits are a great way to get a feel for the college atmosphere and colleges want you to come visit.

- Attendance will need the following:
  - A letter from the college on their letterhead stating that your student was on campus for a visit on the date of the absence. It must be signed by a college official.

# College Admission Plans

- Non-Restrictive Application Plans
  - Regular Decision
  - Rolling Admission
  - Early Action
- Restrictive Application Plans
  - Early Decision
  - Restrictive Early Action
  - With a restrictive indication, you are committing to attend this school if you are accepted

No matter the plan, you must meet the deadlines!









## Application Process

### Apply Texas

(The Texas Common Application)

This application is used to apply for admission to any Texas public college, as well as to participating community and private colleges. It also includes an application for **scholarships** from participating schools.

(You must apply even if you are in the top 10%!)

### The Common Application\*

www.commonapp.org

This application is accepted by over 1000 institutions in the United States: public and private, large and small, highly selective and modestly selective.

#### \*Requires teacher and counselor recommendations

- →Applications will be available as early as July 1, 2023
- → Check specific college websites for additional instructions.





# Senate Bill 588 – Top 10% Rule

Students who are in the top 10% of their graduating class are eligible for automatic admission to any public university in Texas.

#### To be eligible, students must:

- Graduate from a public or private high school in Texas
- Graduate on the Foundations Plan with the Distinguished Level of Achievement
- Enroll in college no more than two years after graduating from high school
- Submit an application to a Texas public university for admission before the institution's application deadline
  - \*Students are required to provide SAT or ACT scores.
    - \*Students must also take the TSI test unless exempt.



- Senate Bill 175, passed by the 81st Texas Legislature, allows The University of Texas at Austin to limit automatic admission to 75 percent of the university's enrollment capacity designated for first-time resident undergraduate students beginning with admissions for the 2011-12 academic year.
- The University has determined that they will automatically admit all eligible 2024 summer/fall freshman applicants who rank within the top 6% of their high school graduating classes, with remaining spaces to be filled through holistic review.




## The Professional Application

Your application is a reflection of yourself. It is important that you make your application look professional.

- Have someone proofread for spelling if you're not sure, look it up!
- If you don't already have one, create an appropriate email address
- Make an appointment with your counselor if you need help





- Answer the prompt.
- Write and re-write.
- Have someone else proofread.
- Can be compared to SAT writing sample.

Your essay is a reflection of you. It is a way to "sell" yourself to the college admissions committee.



## Recommendation Procedures

- Access the Recommendation Packet from the HHS Counseling Website, or email your Counselor for a copy
- Provide information about you that your counselor or teacher would not already know about you.
- Return the completed packet and résumé along with all requests at least 2 school weeks before the recommendations are due. It is very important that you keep this in mind during the holidays. Late submissions to the counselor may result in late submissions to the college.
- Include a stamped envelope with the address of the college and the return address listed as Hebron HS.
- Recommendations are sent directly to the college from Hebron.





## Résumés

- Many colleges and scholarships will require a résumé
- Keep track of extracurricular activities, awards, clubs, organizations and community service
- Leadership positions should also be included
- Include activities from high school



#### Ordering Transcripts

- Transcripts are requested online through Scriborder. Visit the following website to learn more: https://lewisvilletx.scriborder.com
- Many transcripts can be submitted online, but some may require a stamped addressed envelope. Your registrar will contact you if additional materials are needed.
- Each student receives 5 free transcripts. Each additional transcript is \$5.
- ❖ Unofficial transcripts are available in Skyward under the Portfolio tab.
- Students who took Dual Credit from Collin College must request their COLLIN transcript from the COLLIN website to go to the university.
- AP Credit: students must also request College Board to send AP scores to the university, directly from the testing organization.

#### Counselors Do Not Handle Transcripts





\*\*\*The State of Texas requires ALL senior students to address the FAFSA. It is a graduation requirement\*\*\*

- Parents may apply for financial aid beginning October 1st of the **senior** year using this year's income tax return statement. Applications are on the FAFSA website at: <a href="http://www.fafsa.ed.gov">http://www.fafsa.ed.gov</a>
- Both the student and one parent must have an FSA ID number. Apply for the FSA ID by creating an account at:

# NCAA Eligibility Center

## National Collegiate Athletic Association

NCAA Eligibility: The Eligibility Center processes academic qualifications for all prospective Division I and Division II athletes and determines whether they are eligible to compete.

If you plan to play sports in college you should be on track to graduate on the Foundations high school plan with an endorsement and the required amount of NCAA-approved courses(16).

Colleges prefer that you apply at the end of your sophomore year. Submit your transcript and SAT or ACT scores.

Students should contact the Academy of their choice soon after January 31st of their junior year and send a written request for an application to your State Senator or Representative in April of their junior year to allow adequate time to meet all requirements.
