Infrastructure Importance

- Infrastructure is the required "highway"
- Addressing for growth and obsolescence is inevitable
- Classroom technology (projection, sound, printers) are critical elements that help support instruction.
- All critical systems for instructional use, operation use, and safety and security run on the LISD technology infrastructure.
- The current infrastructure needs to be replaced within the next 5 years.

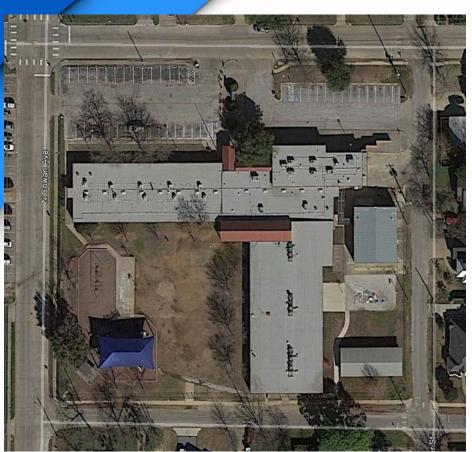

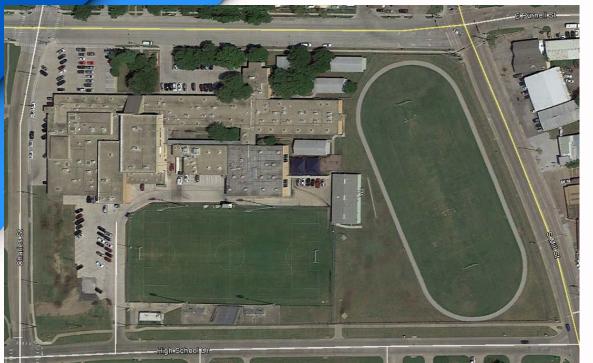

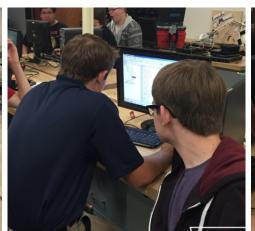


Overview of CTE Programs & Courses

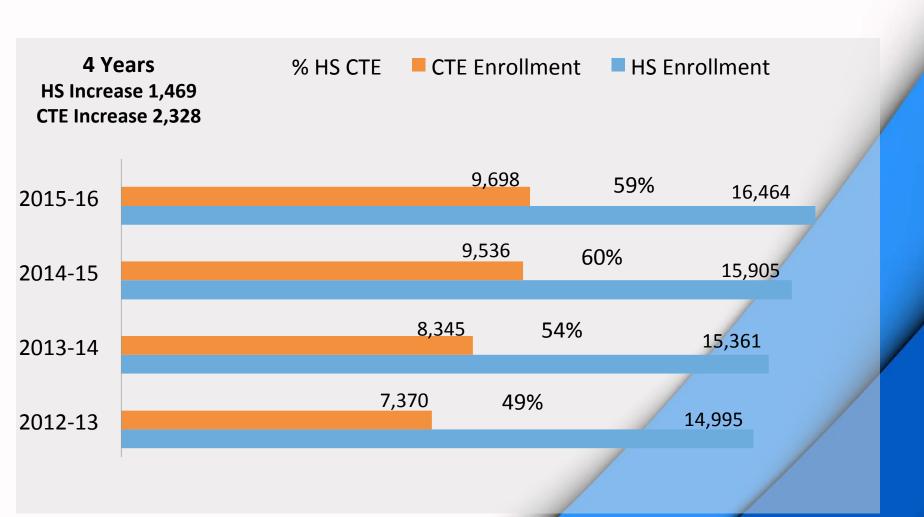

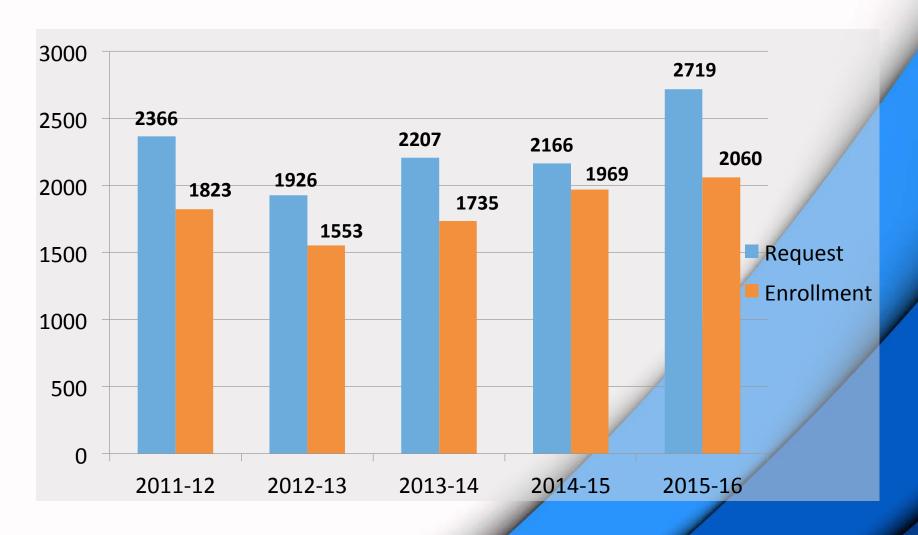

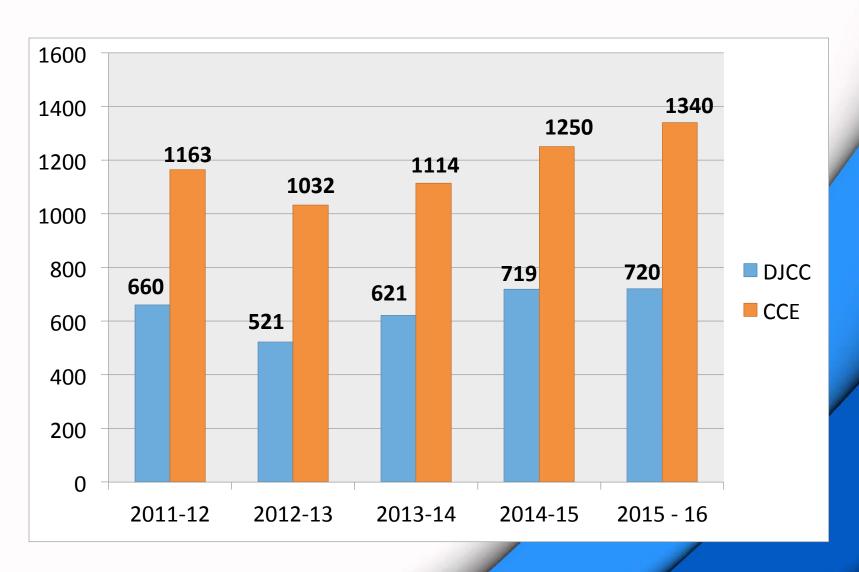




Career Centers Requests vs. Enrollments

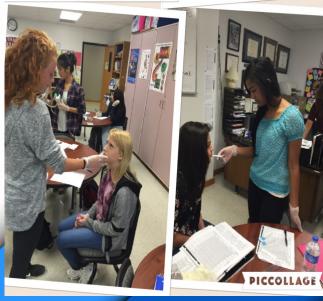

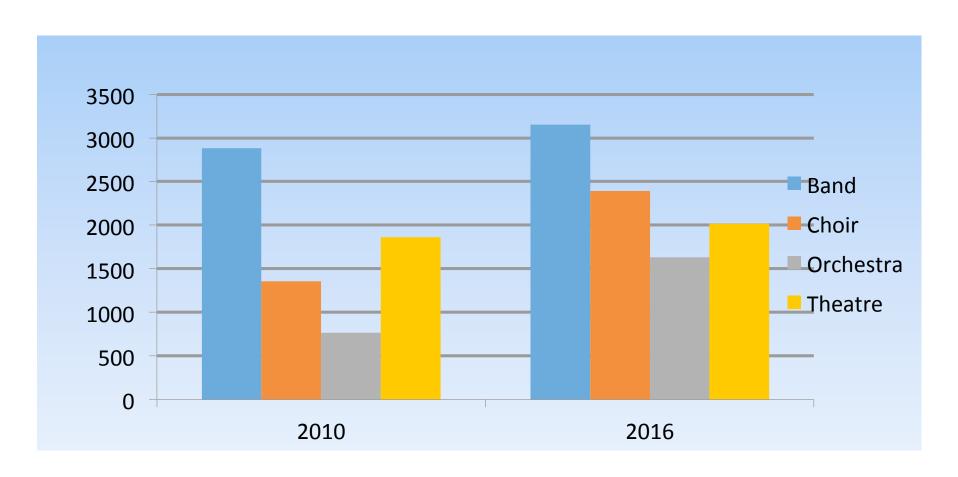

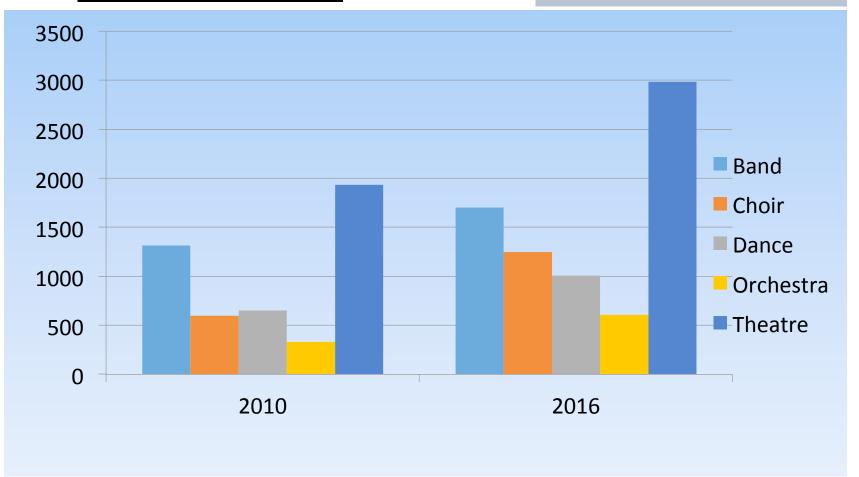

High School Enrollment Performing Arts 2010 to 2016

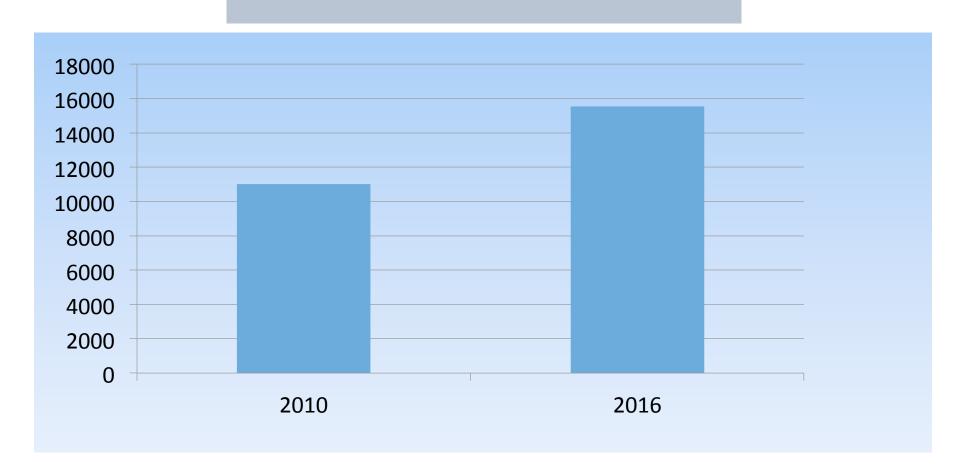

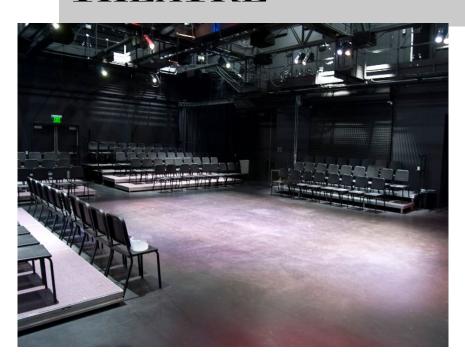

- Auditoriums Often in Use by Other School Activities



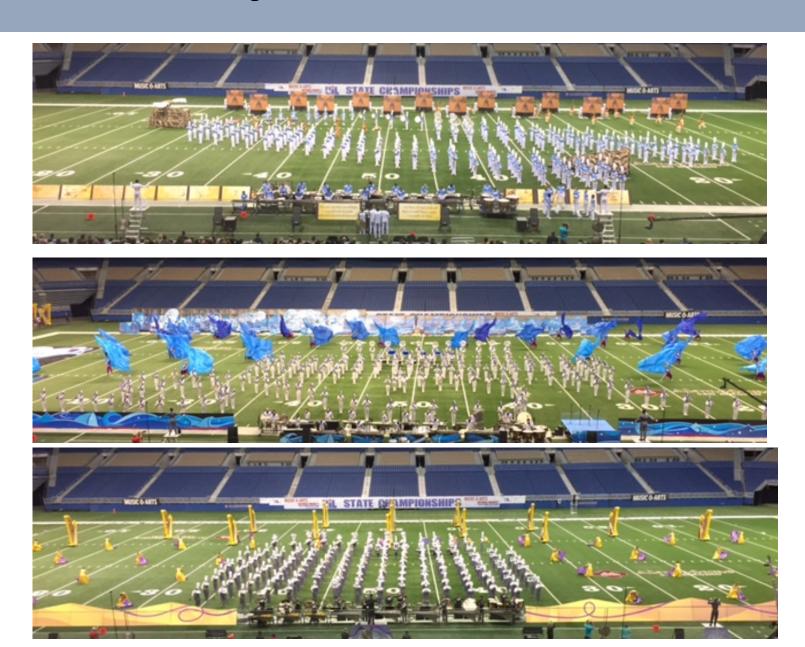
