# The College List

The best strategy for minimizing college costs is creating the right college list.

The “right” list is going to be different for different students and dependent upon:

- Family’s ability to pay for college
- Unweighted GPA
- Rigor
- Test scores
- College fit factors
  - Type of academic environment
  - Desired major

## Category 2:

- No financial need, “high stat” student

## Category 3:

- No financial need, not “high stat” student

# The First Sorting Tool: Financial Need?

The first step in figuring out which colleges to apply to with financial goals in mind requires a family to decipher whether or not they have financial need.

All families should calculate their Student Aid Index or SAI (formerly called Expected Family Contribution or EFC).

## If you have financial need

Families with financial need should focus on schools that MEET NEED.

There are approximately 75 colleges that meet full financial need. Here is our short list/suggested schools to start looking at for families with need:

- Rice University
- Davidson College
- Lafayette College
- Trinity University (San Antonio)
- Kenyon College
- Emory University (Atlanta)
- Carleton College
- Colorado College
- +All the “big name” private schools (Stanford, Johns Hopkins, Ivy League schools)

## Do Ivy League schools give merit scholarships?

No, the Ivy League as a group does not award merit, talent, or athletic scholarships to prospective students. Instead, Ivy League colleges offer some of the strongest need-based financial aid programs in the world.

**THERE IS NO WAY TO GET MONEY FROM MOST ALL THE “BIG NAME” PRIVATE SCHOOLS UNLESS YOU HAVE FINANCIAL NEED.**

## No financial need, but “high stats”

If your student has a terrific GPA, solid rigor, and strong test scores, these are colleges that CAN give merit scholarships that MAY result in a total cost of attendance under \$20,000. Colleges must have money to give money.... Look for strong endowments.

## No financial need, not a “high stat” student

Below are colleges with strong programs/comparatively solid quality of education that have a relatively low cost of attendance, even without financial need or merit scholarships.

## Popular Colleges TX Students Apply to that DO NOT give much \$\$\$

Then, there are a lot of “in between” colleges that may or may not give money, depending on the student’s profile.

## But what about those outside scholarships?

The most honest thing you can hear about outside scholarships is that they are NOT a college payment plan. Students (and parents) need to think of them as bonus money.

You should NEVER pay anyone to help you find scholarships. This is one of MANY scams out there where predatory people/businesses capitalize on the opaque nature of the college application process. The same is true for filing the FAFSA. Do not pay a service to do this for you or one that claims to help maximize your aid eligibility.

But... students should still apply for scholarships. On the next slide are some of the BEST ones for LISD students.

# Best Opportunity Scholarships for LISD Students

Here are scholarships every senior should apply for:

  - Opens the first Friday in November and is due in January.
  - It's open now!
- The Elks Club Most Valuable Student Scholarship
- Fort Worth Scottish Rite Masonic Society Scholarship
- Women of Flower Mound Scholarship (do not need to be female)
- (if Aggie-Bound) Denton County A&M Alumni Scholarship
- (if Catholic) Knights of Columbus
- Co-Serv Scholarship (if you use Co-Serv)
  - Deadline passed already
- (if engineering) Texas Engineering Foundation - Fort Worth Scholarship
- (if a UIL athlete) HEB Scholarship

## Eyes Wide Open

Going into the application process with good and honest information is your best tool to actualize your financial aid goals while minimizing the surprises that can pop up about how much college actually costs.

There are colleges out there that are within reach for EVERY budget. Be realistic about your goals, don't apply to schools you can't afford, and hone in on the places where you have the best odds of receiving funding.

Remember to apply for outside scholarships, but be realistic about the potential for money earned through that application process.
